How children and young people informed the Children and Young People's Plan

The views of children and young people helped create the Children and Young People's Plan.

Over 11,000 children were consulted during the discovery phase of our bid for UNICEF Child Friendly City status, and 60,000 pupils in 187 schools across Greater Manchester took part in the Bee Well Survey.

The findings from those consultations have shaped and informed this plan.

Outcome framework

We will measure progress on our priorities through a number of ways. These will include monitoring data, learning about what works well, looking at the impact, and gathering feedback. Most of all, we will be listening to the views of children and young people. We will also review progress and the impact each year.
